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These California dams need repairs. But Newsom, legislators battle over grants to fix them

Several dozen dams throughout California could store up to 107 billion more gallons of water if they underwent repairs to fix safety problems. But facing a staggering state deficit, Gov. Gavin Newsom has proposed cutting funding for a dam repair grant program in half this year, while state legislators want the \$50 million restored.

California has an aging network of nearly 1,540 dams — large and small, earthen and concrete — that help store vital water supplies. For 42 of these dams, state officials have restricted the amount of water that can be stored behind them because safety deficiencies would raise the risk to people downstream from earthquakes, storms or other problems.

Owned by cities, counties, utilities, water districts and others, these dams have lost nearly 330,000 acre-feet of storage capacity because of the state's safety restrictions. That water — equivalent to the amount used by 3.6 million people for a year — could be used to supply communities, farms or hydropower.

Two years ago, in the depths of the most recent drought, Newsom touted dam repairs as a key approach to shore up water supplies squeezed by climate change. In his 2022 Water Supply Strategy, he referenced plans by his administration and the Legislature to create a grant program to "help local water districts regain lost storage capacity and improve public safety" of dams.

The program, created in 2023 and allocated an initial \$100 million, is still getting up and running.

But now, reeling from the massive deficit, Newsom has proposed cutting \$50 million this year. The Legislature as of Wednesday has kept that money in its proposed budget; negotiations are continuing.

"This investment is the trifecta: It gives you public safety, because you don't want dams breaking. It gives you climate resilience, because we could have flooding," said Assemblymember Diane Papan, a Democrat from San Mateo. And, she added, "It will impact our water supply."


Newsom spokesperson Alex Stack declined to address CalMatters' questions about dam safety funding, citing the negotiations. "We'll have more to share soon," Stack said.

Dam owners facing hundreds of millions to billions of dollars in repairs are urging lawmakers to add more funding for projects in a multibillion dollar climate bond, which also is being negotiated.

"It's so important that we have the storage capacity to be able to collect water in wet times, so that we have it during times of drought," said Cindy Tuck, a deputy executive director of the Association of California Water Agencies, which represents more than 450 public agencies.

Hundreds of dams are at least a century old

Statewide, dams help corral floods, generate power and store water for cities and farms. But California dams on average are more than a de-

cade older than the national average, with 328, roughly a fifth, that are at least 100 years old.

Despite their age, dam disasters are extraordinarily rare. In March 1928, the nearly brand-new St. Francis dam northwest of Los Angeles collapsed — killing more than 450 people in the second-deadliest disaster of California's history. In 1963, the Baldwin Hills dam in southwest Los Angeles breached, killing 5 people and damaging \$15 million in property.

A major earthquake severely damaged the Lower San Fernando Dam in the 1970s — leaving only "a thin dirt wall... between 80,000 people in the San Fernando Valley of southern California and 15 million tons of water," the U.S. Geo-

logical Survey reported. And the Oroville dam's compromised spillways forced the evacuation of nearly 190,000 people during the storms of 2017. Each major dam failure or near-miss has spurred greater oversight.

Papan said as the chair of the Assembly's water, parks and wildlife committee, the threat of deteriorating dams keeps her awake at night. "I don't want somebody to look back and say 'They knew this was going to be an issue, but they didn't put any money towards it.""

The American Society of Civil Engineers gave California's dams a C- on its most recent infra-

New Report Details Massive Federal Funding Gap For Workforce Prep Compared To Degree Programs Despite Persistent Labor Needs

Only one-fifth of federal investments in postsecondary education support workforce development for fields like construction and manufacturing, while the rest of the money goes to "traditional" degree programs according to a new report on federal workforce funding levels released today. The report, which was produced by the Progressive Policy Institute, the Associated General Contractors of America and Procore, notes that this funding gap is making it hard for many employers to find qualified workers to hire.

"If the U.S. does not act now to ensure the nation's workforce is prepared for open job opportunities, more Americans will be unqualified for work and employers will continue to struggle to find talent and remain competitive,"

the report notes. "Yet policymakers continue to undervalue the importance of workforce development and instead prioritize investments in degree programs that often aren't needed to get a good job."

The report, titled Building a Stronger Workforce: Federal Spending on Postsecondary Education and Training, notes that of the \$139.5 billion the federal government spends annually on postsecondary education, only \$28.2 billion goes to workforce education and training programs. The other \$111.3 billion supports "traditional" degree programs that only 38 percent of Americans complete.

The funding gap is making it hard for employers in fields like construction and manufacturing, which typically require specific training not offered by traditional degree programs, to find enough qualified workers to keep pace

with demand. The report notes that the Bureau of Labor Statistics shows the construction industry alone has over 407,000 unfilled position and that figure is expected to continue growing. Meanwhile, 88 percent of construction firms report having a hard time finding workers to hire.

Included in the new report are recommendations on how federal policy makers can help address workforce shortages for in-demand industries. Those recommendations include increasing federal investments in workforce development, including doubling the amount of money for Perkins and other career and technical programs.

The report also recommends new investments in faster and more flexible training programs like Virginia's FastForward program. The report urges new incentives to encourage

employer-centered workforce education and training partnerships. And it cites several promising state-based workforce development programs, including the Virginia one, as well as programs in Indiana, Pennsylvania, and Colorado.

The groups released the report during an event this morning at the U.S. Capitol complex that featured comments from congressional officials, the report's authors, a construction general contractor and a community college administrator. The panelists talked about the challenges posed by the current federal funding levels and urged policy makers to help.

'Wouldn't be where I am today:' California's small business owners fight to save state aid

Lina Mills recalls how she came to this country from Colombia at age 16 having never worked a day in her life.

Once she arrived, she found work in restaurants. "I had to provide for myself," Mills told CalMatters recently. "I basically ran from home"

She knew some English, learned more, and worked her way up to catering manager. Now, 36 years later, she owns two businesses in San Francisco

She employed a dozen workers at Creative Ideas Catering and Creative Ideas Cafe but "had to send everybody home" during COVID lockdowns and the subsequent slowdown. She has since been able to rehire some — she is now back up to 10 workers and hopes to hire more. "I want to not just offer jobs to people who used to work for me — I'm trying to create more jobs."

Mills has relied on programs that help small business owners with financing, marketing, accounting and social media skills, which enabled her to participate in pop-ups for food takeout during the pandemic's height. Acknowledging the free aid she received from a Small Business Development Center and the Renaissance Entrepreneurship Center, she said "I have no idea what I'd do without them."

But such aid to small businesses is now in jeopardy across California. The Renaissance center, which receives some state funds through the Small Business Technical Assistance Program, could see a drop in funding because of the state's massive budget deficit. Since 2018, the program has supported centers that help under-resourced small businesses in low-wealth, rural and disaster-affected communities, and those owned by women, people of color and veterans. Now Gov. Gavin Newsom is proposing to slash the program's budget by 56%, or \$13 million.

Mills recently testified urging state lawmakers not to cut funding for the program. Small business leaders and advocates traveled to the Capi-

tol last week and among other things lobbied against the cuts. Last weekend, state legislators released their proposed budget, which rejects the governor's cuts to the program and restores its full annual \$23 million funding.

The Legislature passed a placeholder budget Thursday. The governor and legislators are likely to wrestle over their budget priorities until the end of the month.

Alex Stack, spokesperson for the governor, told CalMatters that budget negotiations are ongoing and noted: "Gov. Newsom has invested billions of dollars in small business grants, tax relief, and other incentives over the past few years."

When Newsom presented his revised budget proposal in early May, the governor said "these are programs that I've long advanced, many of them. None of this is work you enjoy doing, but you have to do it. We have to balance the budget."

The staff of Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel, the Encino Democrat who's chair of that chamber's budget committee, did not reply to questions about this specific program. The California Of-

fice of the Small Business Advocate, which administers it, said it had no comment.

If the program's funding is cut by more than half, it could "affect 75,000 small businesses per year that contribute to the state's tax base," said Carolina Martinez, chief executive of CAMEO Network, a small business advocacy group.

More than 90% of California businesses employ fewer than 10 employees, and 7% of the state's businesses have 20 to 100 employees, according to the Public Policy Institute of California.

"Capital alone is not enough," Martinez said, adding that small business owners need "clear business plans and a clear idea of their value proposition — things that are going to allow them to succeed and grow." Small business development centers and other organizations can help owners with that, which Martinez said is important for first-generation entrepreneurs and immigrants "who may not have the networks and expertise" they need.

Ernesto Delgado is among the entrepreneurs singing the praises of the state's technical assistance program and other small business programs.

"I was able to speak directly to accountants, legal, HR," Delgado said. "I didn't have to pay for them. I couldn't afford them." Those professionals helped him see the importance of creating an "evolving business plan," he said.

He started off with one restaurant and now owns six in the Sacramento area, which during peak times employ about 150 workers, he said. Delgado said attending a Small Business Administration course for emerging leaders set him on a path to management and entrepreneurship classes, then culinary school.

"I wouldn't be where I am today without some of these programs and connections through my relationship-building," said Delgado, whose restaurants include Mayahuel, his first, and Octopus Peru, one of his newest. "I don't think I would've made it through COVID."

Farther down the state is a different type of example of the impact of that technical assistance. A San Diego restaurant owner, Rodnia Attiq, is counting on the help she received from APEX Accelerators, a small business accelerator that focuses on government contracts, to land a big client: the U.S. Coast Guard, which is seeking a small business to serve food seven days a week at its station in San Diego.

For El Borrego, which specializes in lamb tacos and is a family-owned business with nine people on the payroll, applying for a government contract was no joke, Attiq said.

"You have no idea how hard it was," she said, adding that even with the help of APEX, which gets some funding from the state technical assistance program, completing the 140-page proposal took "10 days, nonstop, till 11 p.m. or midnight."

But she felt all the hard work was necessary. "Everything is changing for the restaurant business," she said. "It's not easy. You have to look for all ways to keep in business."

Now, Attiq is waiting to hear whether she won the contract. She's optimistic: "I already have my route worked out, and what time I'm going to wake up."

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structure report card in 2019. And in 2021 the state's auditor said "the condition of some of the State's potentially most hazardous dams remained a concern." Dam safety inspectors have rated conditions at 133 of them as less than "satisfactory."

According to the grant program's guidelines, "in many cases, these dams pose a significant threat to communities downstream." The state restrictions aim to reduce that threat by limiting the amount of water they can store.

Shawn Jones, assistant manager of the state's Division of Safety of Dams, said California has the largest dam safety program in the nation, over-

seeing roughly 1,230 dams with more funding and staffing than any other state.

Jones said that he wouldn't characterize the 42 dams that have storage restrictions, which average around 100 years old, as "unsafe." "All dams provide some sort of risk downstream," he said. "These dams have an additional risk, and we're driving it down in the interim" with the storage restrictions.

But repairs are often slow-moving because of lengthy environmental permitting processes and massive costs.

"We are finding deficiencies faster than the dam owners can address the deficiencies," Jones said.

Water providers say federal dollars are insufficient, and even \$100 million for the state grant program — though welcome — is just a drop in the bucket. They anticipate mounting costs to shore up aging dams against earthquakes and climate change. Some also are grappling with federal restrictions and local factors, such as sedimentation, that reduce storage.

"This is really a systemic issue, a water issue that is affecting the state of California," said Drew Kleis, assistant director for San Diego's water delivery branch.

Nine dams that store raw water for San Diego are especially geriatric, averaging 92 years old. The state has imposed restrictions on four of them,

cutting into the city's capacity to store water by 20%. Repairs, maintenance, and additional assessments expected to total around \$1 billion.

At San Diego's Lake Hodges, a dam near Escondido is more than a century old. It is deteriorating, raising concerns about its ability to withstand a major earthquake. State restrictions have cut its original storage capacity of roughly 38,000 acre-feet — already substantially reduced by sedimentation — by nearly 30,000 acre-feet. The dam is expected to be replaced by 2034.

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
